Meet Caleb, a young firefighter who is studying International Rescue and Relief at Union. As a firefighter, he has faced many challenging situations, but none rivaled his battle to pay for his college education.

A few months ago Caleb slowly climbed the six flights of stairs in Union's administration building with a very heavy heart. **He had done everything possible to fund his own education. He spent summers working 60 hour weeks as a firefighter** and juggled his schedule hoping to graduate in three years instead of four.

Caleb found out that sometimes hard work just isn't enough.

After completing high school and taking an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) class, Caleb joined the local fire brigade. He dreamed of attending Union College and worked for a year, saving all the money he could for tuition. His firefighter friends and mentors were supportive and proud of him for pursuing a college education. "In rural Virginia that doesn't always happen," Caleb admitted.

At Union, his professors quickly recognized his skill and experience, and by the second semester, Caleb began working as a teaching assistant in the EMT class.

The first summer, Caleb and his classmates honed their rescue skills in the Colorado wilderness by diving into fast flowing rivers, searching for missing people and practicing rescue theory.

On an emotional high, Caleb returned home to Virginia for the rest of that summer. There was no time to rest. Putting his new skills into action, he taught his fellow firefighters some of the techniques he'd learned. **Caleb worked 60-hour weeks, fighting against time to earn what he needed to enroll for his sophomore year at Union.**

He didn't have enough money for the semester until people like you pitched in to give him a scholarship. So with the money he'd saved, his job at Union and help from his tiny church home in Virginia, Caleb enrolled in year two.

Caleb learned to suture wounds, administer IVs and make basic medical assessments. He spent several months in remote villages of Nicaragua with his classmates, helping those in need, under the guidance of Union's IRR team. He loved every long day and every mosquito-plagued night.

Caleb excelled, and his teachers recognized his passion and his gift. They offered him the chance to help facilitate the summer course. But...

In the fall of 2017, Caleb knew he didn’t have the funds to finish the semester.


